## Response to: Fisheries Management Measures within Scottish Offshore Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) (August 19, 2024)

Scottish Renewables (SR) welcomes the opportunity to provide the views of our members to the Scottish Government's consultation on Fisheries Management Measures within Scottish Offshore Marine Protected Areas (MPAs). We have opted to provide our high-level response within this letter.
